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President's Message

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Willan at Duke

ur drive to Florida this year has taken us to several places of interest. Among these were our visit to the three cities of Chapel Hill, Durham, and Raleigh, North Carolina.

We were especially delighted to see the Chapel of Duke University, built between 1930 and 1935 and seating 1500 in the main chapel. It is English Gothic in style, and its immense interior, measuring 291 x 63 feet with a height of 73 feet in the nave is filled with treasures in wood and glass. The exterior of bluestone and limestone features figures of important people in early American history along with historic religious persons.

The university is named after Washington Duke and his sons, Benjamin Newton and James Buchanan, a family of industrialists and philanthropists who were its chief benefactors. While we were in Raleigh, Sally Duke Biddle Trent Semans, a lifelong philanthropist and granddaughter of Benjamin Newton died on January 25th at age 91. Her funeral was held in the Chapel of Duke University

Of interest to organists are its three distinct and distinguished organs. A four manual post-Romantic Aeolian organ of some 6700 pipes housed in the chambers on either side of the chancel. It is used to accompany the choir and worship services. Built in 1932, it was the company's last major instrument before it merged with E.M. Skinner.

In the Memorial Chapel is a two manual Brombaugh organ (1997) which is modelled after Renaissance Italian instruments and has been modified to accommodate other schools of organ music. The Mediterranean-like casing is most attractive.

In the specially designed balcony is a handsome four manual Flentrop tracker action organ of about 5000 pipes. The organ, both tonally and visually, reflects the techniques of 18th century Dutch French organs.

The highlight of our visit to the chapel on Saturday morning was to hear the chancel organ. As we later discovered, the organist was rehearsing for a Sunday recital at 5 pm. I eventually recognised the music: Healey Willan's Introduction, Passacaglia and Fugue. On reading the Duke University newspaper which we picked up in Divinity Hall, we saw an ad for the concert: Organist David Arcus, Chapel Organist, in a programme of CANADIAN works including Willan's Introduction, Passacaglia and Fugue, plus a tribute to the Canadian rock band RUSH!! Too bad we were unable to attend.

If you are ever in that area, do plan to visit the exquisite campus of Duke University and its magnificent chapel - easily one of the great church buildings of North America.

he RCCO National Office and the Ottawa Centre have funds available to help members young or old, at any stage of their career, to participate in educational and professional development activities.

Ottawa Centre Scholarships

Scholarships for Piano Students

Each spring our RCCO centre invites applications from teenaged piano students (minimum of Grade 8 piano) and/or beginning organ students (less than one year of study). Successful candidates will receive 10 hours of organ lessons from a RCCO Ottawa Centre teacher as an introduction to the organ. We encourage all piano students who are seriously considering studying the organ to apply.

All eligible candidates will be invited to play the following at an informal audition:

- i) a prepared piano piece no longer than 5 minutes
- ii) a prepared hymn (introduction and 2 verses)
- iii) a simple hymn tune as sight-reading

Candidates who have already begun organ lessons may play their audition repertoire on the organ.

Anthony King-Douglas Gibson Scholarship and Allen Cureton Scholarship

These scholarships, worth up to \$500 and \$300 respectively, are awarded annually to Ottawa Centre members planning to attend a summer course, conference or other professional development activity. Kiwanis Festival Scholarship

The Ottawa Centre offers a \$500 organ scholarship through the annual Kiwanis Festival of Music and Dance.

The Godfrey Hewitt Memorial Scholarship Trust Fund:

The Godfrey Hewitt Memorial Scholarship was established in memory of the late Godfrey Hewitt, C.D., D.Mus. (Cantuar), FRCO, Hon. ARSCM. Its purpose is to provide an annual scholarship of \$5,000 to an advanced Canadian organ student (or landed immigrant in Canada) who wishes to pursue courses of study either at a university or with a particular teacher, either within Canada or abroad. Funds may be used for tuition, travel, living expenses, and such other purposes as may be appropriate to the circumstances of the award.



Required repertoire for the following spring's competition will be announced in the autumn of each year.. All applicants shall satisfy the following requirements:

- Canadian citizenship, or landed immigrant status in Canada;
- aged 35 years or less;
- graduate, or about to graduate from university, conservatory or college;
- RCCO Associate diploma or similar academic level of qualification;
- stated intention of teaching organ (either in an academic institution or privately, not necessarily as the candidate's primary career).

Applications must include: 1) a detailed resumé and proof of citizenship or landed immigrant status, 2) a specific plan of study for the year, 3) three references, 4) a cassette/CD made in the past 12 months of three major works (see web site for details) and 5) a non-refundable fee of \$40 payable to RCCO—Ottawa Centre. Deadline for submissions is April 30th, 2012. The Godfrey Hewitt Memorial Scholarship of \$5,000 has been awarded annually to advanced Canadian organ students each year since 2005.

The Godfrey Hewitt Memorial Prize of \$5,000 will be awarded as the Grand Prize at the National Organ-Playing Competition held by the RCCO biannually in conjunction with the College's National Convention in odd-numbered years; the first of these Grand Prizes will be awarded in 2011.

National Office Scholarships

The John Goss Memorial Scholarship

This scholarship is awarded by the College in even numbered years in memory of the late John Goss, FRCCO, former conductor of the National Ballet of Canada and relative of his namesake, the British composer Sir John Goss. The scholarship of up to \$3,500 is awarded to an individual for advanced organ study outside Canada. The winner must intend to return to Canada to pursue his/her career. Please note that this in NOT an examinations scholarship, and requires a separate application. The application deadline is March 31, 2012. 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The Lorna and Murray Holmes Scholarship:

The Lorna Holmes Scholarship is available annually, and provides \$1,000 to a student entering organ or church music studies at a Canadian University. Preference will be given to students beginning undergraduate studies. Applicants must hold membership in the College. A letter of application must be accompanied by a proof of acceptance at a Canadian university, and two letters of reference from people able to assess the candidate's suitability for the scholarship. Rachel Joy Brownell Memorial Bursary:

The purpose of this \$300 travel bursary is to expand the musical horizons of organists from isolated communities by offsetting transportation costs to the annual RCCO National Convention, where no other option would otherwise be available.

Candidates must be current RCCO members in good standing who live more than 500 Kms from the site of this year's convention in Saint John, N.B. Candidates may hold Service Playing Certificate or CRCCO, but not Associate, Fellow or other post-secondary diplomas or degrees. Preference will be given to applicants who have never before attended an RCCO Convention, as well as to females over the age of 45, but male and younger candidates will also be considered. Deadline for applications is March 31st, 2012. Improvisation Workshop Review

Saturday February 11th at St. Matthew's Anglican Church, the resident Organist, Kirk Adsett, led an enthusiastic group of twelve Ottawa Centre members through two hours of recognizing and developing their improvisatory skills. After briefly running through several written works on the topic, Kirk showed the participants how to use scale patterns to develop simple but interesting improvised patterns, using not only the major and minor scales but also the wholetone scale.

Providing samples of simple chord structures for harmonizing a scale, Kirk illustrated the ease of moving through simple harmonies with added patterns of moving notes, changing the degree of motion from variation to variation of a short



phrase. By adding even more harmonic interest, such as by moving the harmony by thirds in a Messiaen-like style, a simple and short piece can attract and hold the attention of a congregation very easily.

Kirk demonstrated, and had several others demonstrate too, how a Biblical passage (such as a Gospel) or a visual picture can be illustrated in a short organ improvisation. Kirk inspired just about everyone present to go up and try their skills at the console, and a number of people undoubtedly surprised and pleased themselves by their proficiency when encouraged by Kirk.

Refreshments were kindly provided by Don Marjerrison, and there was ample time for participants to chat with each other and catch up on the latest news.

Thank you, Kirk, for such an inspiring morning!



K.T.O.S. Our Sister Organization

pring is almost upon us as we rejoice **S** pring is annost upon as in its promise of renewal. Our own R.C.C.O. program will soon be under way in the capable hands of fellow Canadians, namely James Calkin and Valerie Hall. Last fall, it was my privilege to pen an article about love of the organ. In January, Dr. Hayes was emphatic that we should love ourselves enough to take good care of our physical temple. In February, it was my pleasure to pass on recommendations regarding a particular aspect of this love. It would now seem appropriate to talk briefly of another facet of love of the pipe organ. It is without apologies that I speak of the "theatre" pipe organ, an instrument which almost became extinct save for the love of many talented organists and other individuals in revitalizing instruments of yesteryear.

Indeed Kingston was fortunate in having such individuals who resuscitated an instrument located in Ohio. They all shared in the costs of moving and fully restoring it to its former grandeur so that, to this day, it is the largest of its kind in Canada, even larger than many in the U.S. For approximately thirty years now, Canadian artists, as well as some from several other countries, have graced its console, much to the delight of spectator/ listeners from Ontario, Québec and adjacent states. Being capable of lending and bending itself, it has surprised many with its enthralling classical music sounds, its elevating spiritual tones, and its toe tapping music rhythms from the 20's to this day. Indeed, on March 30th, at 8 p.m., one of our own RCCO members, Michael Capon, the organist of St. George's Cathedral in Kingston, will not only grace the beautiful stark white console, but will entertain his audience with music which will be drawn from his own musical background and his perhaps unknown attraction to the theatre pipe organ.

Did Michael fall in love with the Kimball organ, one cannot say. However one cannot but assume that he will bring to us the benefit of his varied background and experience. Attracted to music at age seven when one of his teachers stated "Michael moves well to music", the piano and violin indirectly led him to the theatre. A McGill student in music with messrs Gerald Wheeler and John Grew, he was soon involved in several aspects of the music scene; music for the theatre indeed is an avocation whilst his vocation brought him to serve as organist in several large churches from Toronto east to the Maritimes, culminating, for the moment, in his post as organist and Music Director of St. George's Cathedral in Kingston.

To those of us who are fond members of both the R.C.C.O. and K.T.O.S., Donald Marjerrison's "In Memoriam - Gerre Hancock" brings out, through his remarks and quotation the very essence of theatre organ music, "mastery of improvisations" along with Gerre Hancock's profound statement: "It's all sacred as far as I'm concerned. Some works are better in night clubs than in churches, but anything beautiful is sacred". My generation had the pleasure and benefit of seeing and hearing such theatre organ instruments when their influence, the pleasure they imparted, were very much to the fore. The Casavant theatre organ in the former Regent Theatre here in Ottawa, the Legge mutation Sheas/Maple Leaf Gardens/ Casa Loma in Toronto, the ones in Low's, Capital Theatre and the Cinéma de Paris in Montréal, all spoke to my parents, my, and possibly one more younger generation before almost completely disappearing from the scene. It is therefore with much pleasure that I would invite all of our readers to come, hear and see one of our own R.C.C.O. members as the lights go off and he rises from the floor at the controls of our above mentioned, beautiful, stark white treasure ..

As an old saying goes: "try it, you might like it!"




Saint John Organ Festival 2012



Advertising Policy

1. Any Ottawa Centre member may announce his/her event on the Around Town section of the newsletter free of charge if **he/she is** the coordinator, conductor, **soloist**, or organist/accompanist of the event.

2. If a member wishes to place a free announcement in Around Town for an event of another organization he/she is a member of (not covered by Policy 1), the member must make a written request to the RCCO Centre Executive for approval of that one specific event. Approval may be granted on the basis that this **extraordinary** event would be of specific interest to our members: e.g., church/choral, and/or organ/bells, **and/ or the** encouragement of young organists and pianists.

3. If a non-member wishes to announce an event of his/ her organization in Around Town **free of charge**, he/she must make a written request to the RCCO Centre Executive for approval of that one specific event. Approval may be granted as per Policy 2; in most circumstances, however, we would expect the Organization to pay as per the rates set out by the Centre for advertising.
