President's Message

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No Nonsense

is Luke who tells plainly that even some of his disciples thought that the story of the resurrection of Jesus from the dead was utter nonsense. "But the story sounded like nonsense, so they didn't believe it" (Luke 24:11). In another rendering it reads like this: "Nonsense, mind-boggling, too good to be true."

To tell the truth, one reason they were unimpressed with the message was that they were dubious of the messengers—women! So the empty tomb was like one of those good news/bad news jokes. The good news was that the tomb was empty; the bad news was that it was women who witnessed it. Yet, all four Gospels agree that it was women who were at the tomb first. Why didn't they change the record? Why didn't they revise history to make it more palatable to those males who so often dismissed the witness of women?

A lot of people do this, especially when they want to make their own history look respectable. But there is one reason why the gospel writers kept the record straight. The Church knew that it was not here to conform to the world or please the world. It was here to change the world. And the first thing it did to change the world was to remove distinctions of class and race and gender that allow some people to lord it over other people. In Galatians (3:28), Paul issues what constitutes a manifesto of this new humanity: "In Christ there is no longer Jew or Greek, male or female, slave or free, but we are all one in Christ Jesus."

The Church has taught two things about Easter. You can see them in every Gospel account. Every narrative of the Resurrection is divided into two parts—the empty tomb and the resurrection appearances of Jesus to his disciples.

There is a great variety of testimony on the second point, the Resurrection appearances. Every account is different — different in what happened, when it happened, where it happened, what Jesus said, what he looked like, how many were there, and where it was. There was this great diversity in the record of the appearances of Jesus to his followers.

There was, however, great unanimity on the first point — the empty tomb. The gospel evangelists all agree. They all say the women were there first, and then came Peter. And they all say that the tomb was empty! It was no nonsense at all! You may think it is nonsense, but the Church says that it wasn't. In fact, the Church stakes its existence on the empty tomb. That is why Paul says to the Corinthians, "If Christ is not raised from the dead, then our preaching is in vain, and your faith is in vain" (1 Corinthians 15:14).

Do you wonder why no one seemed to question that he appeared to his disciples? They scoffed at the empty tomb, but they shrugged off reports of Jesus appearing to his disciples all over the place. In the Greek and Roman world where this Christian preaching took place, almost everyone believed in what was called "the immortality of the soul."

Briefly said, this philosophy meant that human beings have two parts: a physical body, and an immaterial spirit or soul. When a person died, the body wasted away, but the soul or spirit lived on somewhere and would live on forever. People in the civilized Middle Eastern world believed this philosophy— the "immortality of the soul." That's why there was no problem with resurrection appearances. They could be explained as manifestations of Jesus' immortal spirit.

The problem was the resurrection. If we have here a case of immortality of the soul, then the body will still be in the tomb. But if we have here a resurrection, there will be no dead body. That's why the first reaction was, "They have taken his body away" (John 20:13).

The difference between the immortality of the soul and the resurrection of the body was no small matter for Christian faith. The immortality of the soul is about our indomitable human spirit. Resurrection of the body is about God's amazing and powerful love. Our spirits live on, but only God can resurrect a body. So, if what we are talking about is immortality of the soul, then all Christianity is about how wonderful human beings are, and how beautiful their spirits are, and how great a potential we have because of our immortal spirits.

If, however, we are talking about the resurrection of the body, then we are talking about God who renews, creates and recreates, and redeems the world. That is the Christian Gospel! Easter is not about the immortality of the human spirit. Easter is about the power of God, who created us to have life in his fullness. God has sent his Son as a promise that he can redeem our lives from whatever it is that keeps us from fulfillment, and has resurrected his Son now as a sign that there isn't anything in all creation, not even death itself, that can stop God from keeping his promise.

One thing is clear. It was no nonsense! Eyewitnesses saw an empty tomb. The grave clothes were still there, but Jesus was alive. And he was alive physically. He had a real body. He was not a ghost, a disembodied spirit. He was a fully physical being. He ate breakfast with them. He invited them to touch his body. "A spirit doesn't have such a body," he reminded them.


Centuries ago the coastal region of the southern tip of Africa was known as the Cape of Storms. The region was a grave-yard for ships. No vessel had been known to round that cape and return.

But there was an intrepid navigator, who believed he could round the cape and return. He succeeded! So, the name of the cape was changed: no longer the Cape of Storms, it became the Cape of Good Hope.

Until Jesus died and rose again, death was a cape of storms. The fear of death tormented uncountable hundreds of thousands of human beings who lived on this planet. But Jesus rounded the cape of death! The Apostle Peter writes: "Now we live with a wonderful hope because Jesus Christ rose again from the dead" (1 Peter 1:3).

No nonsense! Jesus rose again and lives forever more. If we believe in him and commit our lives to him, we have the promise that we too shall live—live a life of communion with him now and after our death live with him a resurrected life for all eternity.

I was really happy to read René Péron's article in the February issue of *Pipelines* about looking after your hearing. I have used musicians' earplugs for about twenty years, and have recommended them to several other people.

The ones pictured with that article were not actually "musicians' earplugs", which are made to measure, and fit as hearing aids do. The real musician's earplugs such as the ones pictured below have no battery and they don't wear out. Although they cost a couple hundred dollars to start with, they last a long time without any further expense.




I wear them to practise and to play church services, and after a couple of minutes, I forget all about them. The organ is a loud instrument at times, and some kind of protection for your ears is a good idea, especially if you sit near the pipes. I fully endorse René's recommendations on caring for your ears. It's "sound advice".

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Pro Organo Concert Review

The third concert in the Pro Organo Series for 2011-12 featured James Calkin, organist at First Baptist Church, Ottawa, and 'cellist Evan Jones, Associate Professor of Music at Florida State University. On Friday March 9th at Rideau Park United Church they presented a well-balanced programme of works for organ, organ and 'cello and solo 'cello.

High voice instruments like the trumpet, flute, violin or oboe are frequently heard with the organ but rarely are low voice instruments featured. In fact, this is the first time in the 23 years of the Pro Organo Series that the violoncello has been paired with the organ!

The first half of the programme included two Baroque works and one modern piece. James Calkin opened the programme with Johann Krebs Prelude and Fugue in C. This was a sensitive performance with great attention to detail usually reserved for music of Krebs' teacher and mentor J.S.Bach. The audience was treated to the clear-speaking sounds of the 1989 Guilbault - Therien organ with 3 of the 4 divisions reaching the listener directly from the front and the 4th unimpeded from the gallery at the back. An added attraction is the movable console which allowed the audience to see the performer in action and the Krebs provided several opportunities for Mr. Calkin to demonstrate his smooth pedal technique.

Evan Jones joined James Calkin to present *A Song Without Words for 'Cello and Organ* (2007) by American composer and organist, Craig Phillips. Together, they gave a moving performance of this brief work, with its soulful lines and sumptuous harmonies, written as a memorial to Phillips' brother, Brooks.

The main work for the duo on the first half of the programme was J.S. Bach's Sonata in G, BWV 1027. This sonata was written for viola da gamba and harpsichord. It also appears as a trio sonata with two flutes and continuo, and has sometimes been performed on baroque oboe or trumpet with either harpsichord or organ. It was interesting to hear it again with a slightly different instrumentation. The 2nd and 3rd movements of this 4-movement Sonata worked particularly well in this performance. The interchange of the sprightly dance-like motif in the second movement was emphasized by the difference in instrumental colour between the 'cello and the organ, and the long melancholy lines of the contrasting third movement were easily sustained on the organ.

The second half of the programme opened with William Walton's *Passa-caglia for Solo 'Cello (1982)*. From the

opening phrase, Evan Jones played with a passion and energy that kept the listener's interest in this rather stark and angular work.

The rest of the second half was devoted to two substantial works by French composer Marcel Dupré (1886-1971). Dupré, a brilliant organist and improviser, is mostly known for his compositions for solo organ. However, he also wrote a significant amount of chamber music frequently including the organ. His *Sonata in a minor, opus 60*, for cello and organ, dating from 1864, is a significant and mature work.

The Cortege and Litanie, opus 19, is an early work, and, as James Calkin explained, although written for piano, Dupré himself arranged it for chamber orchestra and then transcribed it for organ. Later organists, including Lynwood Farnham and Todd Wilson, have "re-transcribed" it to fit the organ at hand, and in this spirit, James Calkin performed very effectively his own transcription of the work.

In both these pieces by Dupré, James Calkin was able to unleash the Romantic side of the Guilbault –Therien organ, ranging from combinations with reeds and bright mixtures, to lovely solo stops. The Sonata had frequent changes of mood and character, which demanded a variety of organ colours and demonstrated the fine ensemble playing of the two performers.

The *Cortege and Litanie* was a good choice to end the program as it begins quietly and gradually builds to a fiery conclusion.

Thank you to James Calkin and Evans Jones for presenting this unique and enjoyable programme.

A word of thanks also goes to Karen Holmes for organizing this recital, to Richard Glasser for making the arrangements at Rideau Park, and to Suzanne Marjerrison for the delightful refreshments afterwards.

The Ottawa Centre offers a \$500 organ scholarship through the annual Kiwanis Festival of Music and Dance.



The Godfrey Hewitt Memorial Scholarship Trust Fund:

The Godfrey Hewitt Memorial Scholarship was established in memory of the late Godfrey Hewitt, C.D., D.Mus. (Cantuar), FRCO, Hon. ARSCM. Its purpose is to provide an annual scholarship of \$5,000 to

an advanced Canadian organ student (or landed immigrant in Canada) who wishes to pursue courses of study either at a university or with a particular teacher, either within Canada or abroad. Funds may be used for tuition, travel, living expenses, and such other purposes as may be appropriate to the circumstances of the award.

Required repertoire for the following spring's competition will be announced in the autumn of each year.. All applicants shall satisfy the following requirements:

- Canadian citizenship, or landed immigrant status in Canada;
- aged 35 years or less;
- graduate, or about to graduate from university, conservatory or college;
- RCCO Associate diploma or similar academic level of qualification;
- stated intention of teaching organ (either in an academic institution or privately, not necessarily as the candidate's primary career).

Applications must include: 1) a detailed resumé and proof of citizenship or landed immigrant status, 2) a specific plan of study for the year, 3) three references, 4) a cassette/CD made in the past 12 months of three major works (see web site for details) and 5) a non-refundable fee of \$40 payable to RCCO—Ottawa Centre. Deadline for submissions is **April 30th**, **2012**. The Godfrey Hewitt Memorial Scholarship of \$5,000 has been awarded annually to advanced Canadian organ students each year since 2005.

The Godfrey Hewitt Memorial Prize of \$5,000 will be awarded as the Grand Prize at the National Organ-Playing Competition held by the RCCO biannually in conjunction with the College's National Convention in odd-numbered years; the

first of these Grand Prizes will be awarded in 2011.

National Office Scholarships:

The Lorna Holmes Scholarship is available annually, and provides \$1,000 to a student entering organ or church music studies at a Canadian University. Preference will be given to students beginning undergraduate studies. Applicants must hold membership in the College. A letter of application must be accompanied by a proof of acceptance at a Canadian university, and two letters of reference from people able to assess the candidate's suitability for the scholarship.
