he first concert of the new season takes place on Friday, September 21st, when we will return to the Bruyère Convent Chapel for the first time since their renovation work. It is always a wonderful experience to sit in this beautiful chapel, and we thank Sister Estelle Vaillancourt for the local arrangements.

Ryan Jackson will be our featured artist on September 21st. Ryan won a reputation as one of Canada's most exciting young musicians less than five years after taking up the organ at the age of 17. By 2005, he had won first prize in each of the three prestigious competitions that existed in Canada at that time: the Regional Young Organists Competition in Ontario (RCCO, Toronto Centre), the Osborne National Organ Playing Competition, and the National Organ Playing Competition of the RCCO.

Over the past decade, he has given concerts throughout Canada. He began his university studies with Dr. Patricia Wright in Toronto. In 2006, Ryan moved to the

United States to pursue advanced studies, and he completed the Master of Music degree from the Yale School of Music where he studied organ performance with Thomas Murray. Ryan has lived and worked in Manhattan since 2008, when he was awarded the Godfrey Hewitt Scholarship and moved to New York to begin doctoral studies with Paul Jacobs at the Juilliard School as a C. V. Starr Fellow. In June, he was appointed Director of Music and Fine Arts Ministries at the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church in New York City.

Here is the programme for September 21st: Fantaisie sur "O Canada" - D. Bédard; Prelude and Fugue in E minor - J.S. Bach; Toccatina and Fugue triangulaire - R. Laurin; Prélude et fugue sur le nom d'Alain - M. Duruflé. The second half will consist of the complete Fifth Symphony by Widor.

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


Food for Thought

inding a novel for summer reading can be a challenge since there are so many from which to choose! But there was a book that caught my attention, and triggered several thoughts.

While I was at Chapters, I spotted a table of books on special. Out of the corner of my eye, I saw the name "Pitman." Picking up the book, I noticed that it was one by Walter Pitman, a former choir member back in my Toronto days, and, who, in himself, has made major contributions to the Canadian musical, political, and educational scenes. The first of four biographies that he has written over the last ten years, it was a biography of Louis Applebaum (Louis Applebaum: A Passion for Culture, Dundurn Press, 2002, 512 pages), best known, at least to me, for his work at the Stratford Festival.



When I looked at the price, however, I was mortified. This was a \$2 table! On that book, the price had been marked down from \$39.99 to \$5.99, and then to \$2. I couldn't believe it!

Is the \$2 price an indication of where people think important Canadian history should be located? Cheap. Irrelevant. Details are unimportant.

Money talks, right? We put our money into what we value.

Perhaps one of the things we are missing as Canadians is passion—passion for the interesting details of life that also make significant contributions to our culture. Unlike our U.S. neighbours and others, we often seem to settle for the status quo, lacking the encouragement of ideas that are different. We want to toe the politically-correct line, as much as it may be dragging us down. Let's just be nice.

Musicians, such as Applebaum and many other Canadians, both known and not so well-known, move to a different drummer. Thank God for them! Their work needs to be celebrated, and put on a pedestal.

Let's be a little bolder, and give one another—everyone—more pats on the back. Let's encourage innovation, especially in the church, and those who want to strike out and move us in new directions.

Is not that what art is about? Encouraging society to think deeply, stretching and struggling, and to go beyond itself.

Maybe that is the problem with the music in our churches today? Musicians are not encouraged to go beyond the normal standards, pushing the limits.

And congregations are not really looking for that. They like what they know.

But, it is the pushing of the limits, encouraging boundaries to be moved, even broken, in order that new life might take place. This is certainly the story of the Christian faith, which is my own context. And it is one that definitely does not follow traditional guidelines.

Interesting, it might be pushing current boundaries in order to bring back older ones, even more theologically and biblically focused.

In all of that, biography is hugely important. It sets out the details of a life. Just look at what Applebaum did, and the contributions he made to our Canadian music situation and culture.

Throughout Pitman's writing, there seems to be a lot of overlap. And that is okay, because nothing is really that clear, without layers of connection and meaning.

But this book is not only about the importance of Applebaum, and other kings and queens of Canadian music, whatever musical genre.

So, too, is your own biography as musicians in religious institutions and music lovers belonging to the RCCO, wherever you are and whatever you are doing. I mean to point to this: the importance of who you are and what you do, and in totality: your full identity.

That plays a strong role in professional concerns and support, and it must be nurtured and encouraged. How aware are you of yourself—how you work in your particular faith community? How aware are you of what you, as a person, bring to that perspective, context, and practice?

Perhaps that is why we are struggling these days in many denominations. We are becoming too accommodating and shallow, making excuses, living one-dimensionally, rather than providing solid, prophet leadership, with loving, compassionate grounding.

Perhaps this is also a challenge in our organization, which may, to some, seem outdated. Perhaps we are resting on our laurels, with old-fashioned assumptions and expectations. In reality, perhaps we have lost what we used to have and be, and have not yet gleaned any new ideas or subsequent momentum in order to have renewed mission and vision.

We plug away at maintaining our old systems, rather than letting go, and becoming open to new possibilities and potentials.

Moreover, are we too fearful to make a break from all that, take a few chances, and take the road less travelled? Certainly Louis Applebaum worked in that direction.

Although I am no historian, I am very aware of how the pipe organ is a major part of who we are as the RCCO. Its historic details are necessary; they are a large part of church life. We need to find ways that it can be viewed historically, in terms of what has taken place in Canada. As well, we need to make sure that it moves

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into the future, that the building continues; that, for example, when churches close, organs are not thrown out. We need to make sure that there are places, recital halls and congregations, where there are pipe organs, and they are well kept.

Overall, we need to be able to look back, know where we are in the present, and be actively determining our future.

Perhaps taking more time to look at the

details in life, and to be more self-reflective and appreciative of these dynamics, is the key to our future as an organization, and as faithful musicians in various religious institutions.

Walter Pitman's book, in both how it is being sold and content, is an indication of how such things are being perceived by society, at least a certain part of it, as well as how the arts are an important aspect of any culture, influencing each other.

How is your own passion being activated, and parts of your life, work, and ministry? Put differently, what would you really love to be doing? Are you doing that? Or have you given up?

Maybe letting your spark be re-lit, and being intentional about that, is key to fulfilling your true calling as a person, one of God's wonderful creations, and your own true fulfillment, health, and purpose.

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2012 Godfrey Hewitt Prize Winner

Frances Macdonnell

he \$5,000 Godfrey Hewitt Memorial Scholarship for 2012 has been awarded to STEPHEN BODA.



A Canadian organist from Ontario, Stephen Boda holds a Bachelor of Music degree from the University of Toronto, where he studied Organ Performance with John Tuttle, harpsichord and improvisation with Kevin Komisaruk, and conducting with Jeffrey Reynolds. During this time, he received masterclass instruction from Thomas Murray, Andres Sieling, and Todd Wilson. Stephen was an Organ Scholar at St. John the Evangelist Anglican Church in Hamilton, Ontario, and, while in university, the Peaker Organ Scholar at St. Paul's Bloor Street Anglican Church, Toronto. He has also studied piano privately with Valerie Tryon. This past year he has served as the Associate Organist at Grace Church-on-the-Hill in Toronto, accompanying both the Choir of Gentlemen and Boys and the Choir of Women and Girls. Stephen is beginning a Masters degree in organ performance at Yale University in the fall of 2012.

Godfrey Hewitt, C.D., D.Mus. (Cantuar), FRCO, Hon. ARSCM, died in 2002 at the age of ninetythree. For over seventy years a prominent figure in sacred music in Canada, Dr. Hewitt left a very significant legacy to Canadian music. Born in England in 1909, he came to Canada in 1931 after serving as Organist for the Archbishop of Canterbury at Lambeth Palace, London, in 1930. He became Organist and Master of the Choristers at Christ Church Cathedral, Ottawa, in 1931, and remained there for half a century, until his retirement in 1980. In 1973. Dr. Hewitt was awarded the Lambeth Doctorate of Music by the Archbishop of Canterbury; he was made a Member of the Order of Canada in 1976. He was famed as performer, teacher, composer, and organ designer. This scholarship was established after his death both to honour his memory and to increase the number of highly-trained professional Canadian organists, not only to serve as organists in universities, concert halls, and churches, but also to teach future generations of performers.

Previous winners of this scholarship were Craig Humber (2005), Isabelle Demers (2006), Michael Unger (2007), Ryan Jackson (2008), Matthieu Latreille (2009), Shawn Potter (2010), and Wendy Nieuwenhuis (2011).

The next annual competition for the Godfrey Hewitt Memorial Scholarship in organ will close on April 30, 2013. Details may be found on the web site of the Royal Canadian College of Organists, Ottawa Centre: www.rcco-ottawa.ca There is also a Godfrey Hewitt Prize of \$5,000, awarded as the Grand Prize bi-annually at the National Organ-Playing Competition at the RCCO Convention. The next Prize will be awarded in August 2013.

Approval may be granted per Policy 2; in most circumstances, however, we would expect the Organization to pay as per the rates set out by the Centre for advertising.
