uring our time in Sarasota, Florida this winter, we attended worship at St. Boniface Episcopal Church where, from November to Easter, the Schola Cantorum Choir of the church offers music in the English Cathedral tradition at its traditional service.

This choir of about 25 voices joined with seven other area choirs to present a choral festival sponsored by the Boniface Friends of Music and the Sarasota-Manatee Chapter of the American Guild of Organists. The guest conductor for this event was Dr. Ryan Murphy, the dynamic Associate Music Director of the Mormon Tabernacle Choir in Salt Lake City. While I was not able to attend the choral festival, I did attend a workshop discussing the music at the Mormon Tabernacle, the energetic dress rehearsal for the performance, and the Sunday service where he directed the Schola Cantorum in Haydn's Little Organ Mass. It is the details from the workshop that I want to tell you about.

Dr. Murphy began with a short video giving an overview of the weekly preparation for Sunday telecast including the technical aspect, for the service. The remainder of the workshop was generously given over to the many questions of the approximately 50 people in attendance. Here in point form follows a summary of answers.

HISTORY

1847 choir established

1910 first recording of the choir

1929 Sunday service radio broadcasts begin

MEMBERSHIP OF CHOIR

- Must be member of congregation
- Must live within 100 miles of city
- 405 choir members for 360 seats to cover absences. Attendance taken at all rehearsals.
- Membership reviewed every 5 years. Limited to total of 20 years between age 25-60 whichever comes first; reason: very strenuous physically.

AUDITION

- Interested candidates submit CD of singing voice. On average, 250 apply annually; 55 are selected
- Audition takes place over 8 months beginning August 15.
- If CD submission is selected, the next step involves a 3 hour theory and aural skills assessment, followed by live singing and sight singing which is very important as repertoire has to be learned quickly.
- If candidate passes, entrance is gained to the Temple Choir. From January to April, candidate enters training choir to perfect skills such as sight singing.

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REHEARSALS

- Thursdays: three hours. Public is permitted to attend.
- Sundays: 7:25 8:30 am choir rehearsal; 8:30 9:00 am technical rehearsal;
 9:30 am, live to air.
- Tuesdays: for CD rehearsals which last much of the week twice a year; for special concerts such as with the Utah Symphony, Christmas or concerts of major works; for tours which take place every two years.

REPERTOIRE

- Mainly in the classical tradition. Over 300 pieces per year; need to learn quickly, thus the vigorous audition. Look for timeless music and music about who we are.
- Languages: English, Latin and some French
- · One major work every year
- Record two CDs per year

WARDROBE

- Women: 7 handmade outfits
- Men: 4 different suits

FUNDRAISING

- CDs are greatest fundraiser; over 100,000 sold
- · Endowment Fund
- · Church Budget
- Tours

STAFF DUTIES

- Three full time organists; two part-time.
- In addition to choir, an organ solo each week
- Music chosen by the conductor of the service that week
- Co-ordinate spoken word with music
- Co-ordintate use of instruments, selection of keys for service music

VOLUNTEERS

• Sixteen Librarians to organise thousands

- of pieces of music
- On tour, 500 support the choir
- · Volunteer orchestra

OTHER

Dr. Murphy was raised in Newtown Conn. and attended the school where 26 children were killed. He gave a special concert in their memory. Holds a doctorate in music from Boston University.

When asked about what surprised him most about the job: the need to know about mixing and editing. Every aspect of music timing is crucial and therefore he must be very strict about tempo from Thursday rehearsal to Sunday broadcast service.

In the 70th year of broadcasting in 1999, when asked how to improve the choir, they assumed the challenge of memorising 1 -2 pieces for each service. This was noticeable in the video shown at the beginning of the workshop.

he next concert in the series will feature Wesley Warren at St.

Barnabas Anglican Church, Kent at James, on Friday, April 12th at 7:30 p.m. If you haven't heard the organ at St. Barnabas recently, it's worth the effort, and Wesley, who has been Organist and Choirmaster there since 1987, knows the instrument well.

An honours graduate in organ performance of the University of Toronto (BMus) and the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor (MMus) where his teachers were Douglas Bodle and Robert Glasgow, Wesley was winner of the Royal Canadian College of Organists National Organ Playing-Competition in 1981. He is organ



teacher at Carleton University, Ottawa, and performs organ continuo with the National Arts Centre Orchestra. Wesley has taught at Augustine College (1998-2010) and St. Paul University, Ottawa. He has presented organ recitals throughout Canada, in the U.S., and in Europe, and has been broadcast on CBC.

His programme for April 12th is as follows: Bruhns, *Prelude and Fugue in e minor*; Böhm, *Partitas on "Ach, wie nichtig"*; Bach, *Prelude and Fugue in C, BWV 541*; Hindemith, *Sonata 1*; Willan, *Passacaglia and Fugue No. 2 in E minor*; Franck, *Prélude, Fugue et Variation*; Bossi, *Scherzo in G minor*; Widor *Andante sostenuto*; Mulet - *Carillon-Sortie*.

or the past three years, Tom Annand has been giving lunch-hour recitals at St Andrew's Church in a series entitled Organ Tuesdays. He has presented a wide range of repertoire, including the complete organ works of J.S. Bach, the major organ music of Franz Liszt and the complete Widor symphonies. On Tuesday, March 12, 2013 he presented his one hundredth recital, which he entitled A few of my favourite things ... The previous day, CBC Radio One carried an excellent 15-minute interview with Tom, talking about the recitals over the years and demonstrating the various sounds of the Guilbault-Therien organ at St Andrew's.

Recital number 100 began with two staples of the organ repertoire: J.S. Bach's "Dorian" *Toccata in d minor*, and the *Andante sostenuto* from Charles-Marie Widor's *Symphonie gothique*. Naturally the Bach was at home on this organ, a classically voiced three-manual tracker, and the contrast between the plenum and the Oberwerk was clearly heard in the room. One might think that Widor would be out of place on such an instrument, but some pipes were retained from the church's first organ, built in 1874 by

Samuel Warren, and their smooth sounds were perfect for Widor's quiet *Andante* sostenuto.

Next on the programme was the *Poème symphonique "Orpheus"* (1854) by Franz Liszt, a composer whose music has received many powerful performances by Tom. (You should have heard his performance of the *Ad Nos fantasy* last year – it was fantastic!) Another less well-known piece followed, the *Scherzo in g minor* by Marco Enrico Bossi. Tom ended his recital with the music of Naji Hakim, performing a movement entitled *Agapê* from *L'Amour divin* (2012).



Before playing this piece, Tom spoke to the audience about his experience of studying in France over twenty years ago with Marie-Claire Alain, and meeting Naji Hakim at that time.

Organists of Tom's calibre are rare indeed, and we are very lucky to have him here in Ottawa. His noon-hour recitals are always musically rewarding and inspiring. There are usually around 40-50 people in the audience (double that for #100) – but never another organist in sight! It is amazing to me that as a Centre we pay thousands of dollars to bring in performers from all over the world to play the exact same music Tom offers in his weekly recitals, yet we ignore this wonderful music going on right under our noses. For example, during the last two weeks of Lent, Tom has featured the entire Chemin de la Croix by Marcel Dupré. This important composition of Dupré's is rarely played because of its difficulty, but we have the opportunity to hear it right here in Ottawa.

Congratulations to Tom Annand for achieving recital #100 – may there be many more! And many more Ottawa organists in the audience!

Ottawa Centre Scholarships

Anthony King-Douglas Gibson Scholarship and Allen Cureton Scholarship

These scholarships, worth up to \$500 and \$300 respectively, are awarded annually to Ottawa Centre members planning to attend a summer course, conference or other professional development activity. The funds can contribute toward the cost of attending an RCCO convention, but must be applied to an organized course or event; not to be used for private lessons. Deadline for applications is April 30th, 2013, by letter to the Centre President describing your planned activity, its cost, as well as a brief description of your educational background and present church music activities. Kiwanis Festival Scholarship

The Ottawa Centre offers a \$500 organ scholarship through the annual Kiwanis Festival of Music and Dance.

The Godfrey Hewitt Memorial Scholarship Trust Fund:

The Godfrey Hewitt Memorial Scholarship was established in memory of the late Godfrey Hewitt, C.D., D.Mus. (Cantuar), FRCO, Hon. ARSCM. Its purpose is to provide an annual scholarship of \$5,000 to an advanced Canadian organ student (or landed immigrant in Canada) who wishes to pursue courses of study either at a university or with a particular teacher, either within Canada or abroad. Funds may be used for tuition, travel, living expenses, and such other purposes as may be appropriate to the circumstances of the award.

Required repertoire for the following spring's competition will be announced in the autumn of each year.. All applicants shall satisfy the following requirements:

Canadian citizenship, or landed immigrant status in Canada;

- aged 35 years or less;
- graduate, or about to graduate from university, conservatory or college;
- RCCO Associate diploma or similar academic level of qualification;
- stated intention of teaching organ (either in an academic institution or privately, not necessarily as the candidate's primary career).

Applications must include: 1) a detailed resumé and proof of citizenship or landed immigrant status, 2) a specific plan of study for the year, 3) three references, 4) a cassette/CD made in the past 12 months of three major works (see web site for details) and 5) a non-refundable fee of \$40 payable to RCCO Ottawa Centre. Deadline for submissions is April 30th, 2013. The Godfrey Hewitt Memorial Scholarship of \$5,000 has been awarded annually to advanced Canadian organ students each year since 2005.

The Godfrey Hewitt Memorial Prize of \$5,000 will be awarded as the Grand Prize at the National Organ-Playing Competition held by the RCCO biannually in conjunction with the College's National Convention in odd-numbered years; the next of these Grand Prizes will be awarded

at Orgelfest Ottawa 2013 this summer.

National Office Scholarships:

The Lorna and Murray Holmes Scholarship:

The Lorna Holmes Scholarship is available annually, and provides \$1,000 to a student entering organ or church music studies at a Canadian University. Preference will be given to students beginning undergraduate studies. Applicants must hold membership in the College. A letter of application must be accompanied by a proof of acceptance at a Canadian university, and two letters of reference from people able to assess the candidate's suitability for the scholarship. Barrie Cabena Music Scholarship

The Waterloo-Wellington Centre administers the Barrie Cabena Music Scholarship. Its purpose is, firstly, to honour the contribution made to excellence in church music in Canada by Barrie Cabena, composer, teacher, performer, and secondly, to assist a deserving student(s) in the formal study of organ, church music, and/or composition at the post-secondary school level.

The Barrie Cabena Music Scholarship Fund was initiated by the Waterloo Wellington Center of the RCCO in 2004 on the occasion of Dr. Cabena's 71st birthday. Contributions may be made to the "RCCO Cabena Scholarship".

Receipts will be issued by the RCCO National Office.

Full details are found on the downloadable application form.

Applications for the 2013 Barrie Cabena Scholarship will be received up to May 1st, 2013.

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

Advertising Policy

- 1. Any Ottawa Centre member may announce his/her event on the Around Town section of the newsletter free of charge if **he/she is** the coordinator, conductor, **soloist**, or organist/accompanist of the event.
- 2. If a member wishes to place a free announcement in Around Town for an event of another organization he/she is a member of (not covered by Policy 1), the member must make a written request to the RCCO Centre Executive for approval of that one specific event. Approval may be granted on the basis that this **extraordinary** event would be of specific interest to our members: e.g., church/choral, and/or organ/bells, **and/or the** encouragement of young organists and pianists.
- 3. If a non-member wishes to announce an event of his/her organization in Around Town **free of charge**, he/she must make a written request to the RCCO Centre Executive for approval of that one specific event. Approval may be granted as per Policy 2; in most circumstances, however, we would expect the Organization to pay as per the rates set out by the Centre for advertising.
