Advent - A New Year



President's Message

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he new church year is beginning. It's a time when many look back at the past year and forward to the new. We can all consider our own circumstances from many points of view. In this message, I suggest considering your repertoire choices. One of the challenges of the organist is choosing repertoire from the vast number of worthwhile compositions that have been published. Looking at the works of composers on the anniversary of their birth or death is one way to maintain a fresh look at the literature.

2013 was the anniversary of the birth or death of many composers, including prominent organ composers Johann Ludwig Krebs (1713–1780) and Heinrich Scheidemann (1596-1663). Benjamin Britten (1913–1976) and Francis Poulenc (1899–1963) were also the focus of some attention but their output for the organ is very limited. Canadian composer Violet Archer (1913–2000) wrote several works for organ. (There is still time to play some compositions from these composers in 2013 - there are many accessible works from both these composers available free at www.imslp.org.)

For the coming year, a number of composers whose names come to mind. It is the 300th anniversary of the birth of Carl Philipp Emanuel Bach (1714–1788). Despite the prolific output of his father, he only wrote a small number of works specifically for the organ. Many of his keyboard sonatas

sound wonderful when played on the organ (for example, the 2009 recording of Thomas Trotter "CPE Bach Organ Works").

Thomas Attwood Walmisley (1814–1856) would celebrate his 200th birthday next year. Some know him only for the Anglican chants he wrote, but he also wrote many works for the Anglican liturgy and several organ pieces.

The french theorist and composer Jean-Philippe Rameau (1683–1764) died 250 years ago (next year) but his keyboard works are not part of the common organ repertoire.

So, based on my research, there are not a lot of significant anniversaries in 2014 that could guide us to try works in the darker corners of the shelves of organ repertoire. If you know of any links between the organ repertoire and the year 2014 please let me know of them (russell.kimberwick@me.com) and I will pass them on in the next edition of Pipelines.

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Reesor's Pieces

would like to thank the Ottawa RCCO Centre for making my November 3rd organ recital the November activity. Several of you expressed interest in Reesor's Pieces by John McIntosh (professor emeritus at the University of Western Ontario).

Alan Reesor is the organist at St. Peter's Cathedral in Charlottetown and was our National President from 2004-2006. He is also a long-time friend and former student of John McIntosh, who was one of my teachers at Western. Quite often when John writes a piece, he sends me a copy of the hand-written manuscript and Reesor's Pieces is just one example. With his permission I typeset it onto my computer, with some assistance from Gilles Leclerc.

One of the devices John often uses is taking someone's name and making it into a melody, assigning all 26 letters of the alphabet to the 7 letters used in music. When Lynn and I got married, he wrote a wedding processional for us using our names. Reesor's Pieces uses F Alan Reesor. The second movement is based on the



hymn tune St. Peter, since that is the name of the cathedral where Alan is the organist. The artwork on the cover is courtesy of John's son-in-law and is an imitation of a package of Reese's Pieces!

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Henderson/Gott Concert Review

he Pro Organo recital on November 1, held in Knox Presbyterian Church, was given by Andrew Henderson, the Canadian organist presently serving as Director of Music at Madison Avenue Presbyterian Church in New York, and the brilliant young harpist Michelle Gott who this autumn has joined the Department of Music at the University of Ottawa. The two musicians have worked together for some time. Andrew is particularly wellknown to us in Ottawa, having won the National RCCO Organ-Playing Competition during the National Convention in Ottawa in 2003, and we always welcome him back!

The programme offered by the duo was modern in both concept and content, with demanding organ pieces ranging from Jehan Alain's Litanies to Barrie Cabena's Eine kleine Morgenmusik (Op. 631), with five contrasting movements (more in the style of Messiaen than Mozart), which was written for and dedicated to Andrew Henderson by the composer in 2010. Both of these pieces were effortlesly played by Andrew, and then there were also solo pieces for harp by the American harpist Lynne Palmer and the French master Marcel Grandjany. These pieces stretched the sound of the harp to its fullest, producing tones in the rich acoustic of Knox Church that varied from the quietest of string arpeggios to the loudest bell-like chimes.



But the most intriguing parts of the programme were the pieces for both harp and organ, a combination which continues to fascinate audiences and inspire composers. The *Aria* from Louie White's *Suite for Organ and Harp*, based on a twelvenote theme, introduced the contrasting but cooperating sounds of the two instruments extremely well, while Rachel Laurin's *Fantasia for Organ and Harp* (Op. 52), written in 2009 to be premièred at an AGO National Convention, closed the programme with élan and brilliance.

Some listeners were particularly struck by the serendipitous way in which certain rhythms towards the end of Rachel's concluding piece echoed the rhythms of the Alain *Litanies*, with which Andrew had chosen to open the programme in order to demonstrate the full reeds ensemble of the Knox organ.

Ester Mägi, known as the First Lady of Estonian Music, has written works for organ in combination with many different instruments, but her *Dialog: Prelude with Choral* (1993), for organ and harp, was rewarding and satisfying to the listeners, demonstrating both the mystery and the grandeur which lie at the heart of sacred music. The programme also included little-heard repertoire by American composers Chris DeBlasio and Roderick Gorby.

Sometimes, organ recital audiences feel that they hear too much of the same well-known repertoire over and over again. This programme gave them exactly the opposite, with only a few well-known pieces surrounding much new repertoire. It is tremendously important for us to support both the composition and the performance on a regular basis of new organ music. We are grateful to the Pro Organo Series for providing us with such a satisfying and intriguing programme by these two brilliant and exciting young musicians.

Congratulations are due as always to Karen Holmes for planning and producing the Pro Organo Series, and to Suzanne Marjerrison for a wonderful reception afterwards.



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

Advertising Policy

- 1. Any Ottawa Centre member may announce his/her event on the Around Town section of the newsletter free of charge if **he/she** is the coordinator, conductor, **soloist**, or organist/ accompanist of the event.
- 2. If a member wishes to place a free announcement in Around Town for an event of another organization he/ she is a member of (not covered by Policy 1), the member must make a written request to the RCCO Centre Executive for approval of that one specific event. Approval may be granted on the basis that this extraordinary event would be of specific interest to our members: e.g., church/choral, and/or organ/bells, and/or the encouragement of young organists and pianists.
- 3. If a non-member wishes to announce an event of his/her organization in Around Town free of charge, he/she must make a written request to the RCCO Centre Executive for approval of that one specific event. Approval may be granted per Policy 2; in most circumstances, however, we would expect the Organization to pay as per the rates set out by the Centre for advertising.

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
