Touch: Some Thoughts

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all have to touch the organ keys if we want to play. There is a lot of complexity in the mechanics of muscle use and keyboard design that contribute to successful interaction with the instrument.

A lot of the instruction given on touch in musical performance is expressed in terms of metaphor. "Make your hand like a spider" or "shape your hand like you are holding a ball" are phrases I have heard from many teachers and read in many pedagogical resources. Phrases like these are not meant literally but are an attempt to elicit the "correct" touch. If one metaphor does not work there are many others that may. Leading a student to a refined and controlled touch often involves navigating these vague or ambiguous waters.

The complexity of the hand's biomechanics and the mechanics of the instrument mean that a thorough engineering or scientific description of the situation is well beyond our current understanding so we are constrained to using this metaphorical approach in describing how we do what we do.

The most interesting phrase that has been used by a previous teacher of mine that has a positive effect on my playing is that I should make my "finger tips more present on the keys." As an engineering professor, I have no idea what that means, but for me as a musician, it makes a big difference.

The brain is an amazingly complex organ. One interesting aspect of the brain

is that several regions are organized as representations of the body - they are called *homunculus*. They are hard to describe in words but if you search online for "brain homunculus" you will find plenty of diagrams.



Some brain research suggests that high-level athletes develop representations of the tools of their sports in the brain. This concept has been referred to by a number of terms including *extended physiological proprioception*. So, for example, over time, the brain of a tennis played begins to have a representation of the tennis racquet in addition to the athlete's body. From the point of view of the brain, they actually do become "one with the racquet"; the tennis player does "know" the location of the end of the racquet without looking. This concept also applies to amputees using prosthetic limbs.

I think that by focusing on the "presence" of our fingertips on the keys we are making use of this idea. Over years (decades...?) of practice the brain begins to have a representation of the instrument we are playing. This is perhaps more understandable when the instrument is small like a clarinet and a little more difficult to conceive of for an organ that may be three stories tall. We go from having to reason that "middle C is a third away and that I should use the fourth *finger*" to simply "playing middle C". Focusing on the presence of the fingers on the keys during practice may serve to change the way we are learning based on more physical awareness of what is happening.

What we do as organists is extremely complex, combining visual processing

(sight-reading choral open score) with physical dexterity (distributing the parts, that may have crossed, between two hands and two feet) at a steady pace and then adding in expression and emotional sensitivity. While we are beginning to understand how the brain might manage some of this, it seems to me that for the foreseeable future and perhaps for a very long time, we will continue to describe what we do in terms of metaphor.

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John Grew Concert Review

Friday, March 28, after a 5-year hiatus because of damage to the church building, Pro Organo returned to St. Anne's Church in Lowertown for an organ recital presented by John Grew, Professor Emeritus at McGill University. A good crowd of 130 was treated to a fine recital that showed off Casavant's Opus 701, installed in the church in 1914.

For the first half of the programme, Professor Grew chose repertoire with liturgical ties, beginning with Nicolas de Grigny's *Hymne 'Pange Lingua'*. I couldn't think of a more appropriate way to begin this concert. This church is now home to St. Clement's Parish, a congregation that offers mass and the administration of the sacraments in the traditional Latin form of the Roman Rite according to the liturgical norms of 1962.

Drawing on this, we were treated to two cantors who chanted the hymn before the opening movement (en taille). This instrument is well suited to this repertoire, and the Pédale Trompette 8' clearly gave us the melody in augmentation. The 5-voice fugue featured the Positiv's clarinette against the Récit's cornet. The last movement treated the melody in an ornamented way, again heard on the Récit's cornet.

Continuing in the French baroque, two movements from François Couperin's *Messe des Paroisses* included the grand *Offertoire sur les Grands jeux* and the *Benedictus*. Prof. Grew created just enough lilt in the dotted rhythm section at the end of the *Offertoire* to give it that uplifting feeling. The *Benedictus*, more lyrical, featured the Positiv's clarinette for the melody.

J. S. Bach's setting of *An Wasserflüssen Babylon* (from the 18 Leipzig Chorales) is a very picturesque paraphrase of Psalm 137 (By the waters of Babylon we sat down and wept). Here John Grew used the oboe for the ornamented melody and lyrical phrasing to capture the mood.



Bach's admiration for Vivaldi and the Italian style led to several transcriptions of instrumental concertos for solo organ including the *Concerto in D Minor*, after Vivaldi's *Concerto Grosso in D Minor Op. 3, No. 11*. The opening movement with its hammer-like pedal part where the tonic

note is repeated steadily creates tension and Prof. Grew drew on this to maximum effect. A longer than normal break after the fugue brought us to the Largo. The lyrical phrasing that Prof. Grew used made the dialogue even more special. The final movement, beginning with repeated eighth notes like the first movement, was very convincingly played with good articulation.

The second half began with Healey Willan's *Passacaglia and Fugue No. 2 in E Minor*, written for Sir William McKie of Westminster Abbey in 1959. It begins with a slow (and brief) introduction, and I was favorably struck with the sensitive registration he used to highlight the rubato at the end of the introduction. The passacaglia contains a theme plus twelve variations.

The excitement and tempos increases steadily throughout the first 10 variations before a sudden relaxation in volume and tempo with the last variation in the tonic major key. The hesitation of the pistons to their job in a timely fashion resulted in slight pauses between several of the variations which was very unfortunate.

It was also announced at the concert that a new blower was needed for the organ and fund-raising had begun. The last chord of the fugue, using all the resources of the organ, was proof that a new blower is necessary!
