President's Message

Alone in the Organ Loft

any of us, as organists, spend our time making music for others in the relative obscurity and anonymity of the organ loft. Perhaps alone amongst musicians, an organist performing a recital often has to climb rickety old stairs, unlock a door with a key that may have been made when Henry VIII was still king and sit hidden from the audience during a performance, moving to a special corner of the organ loft to acknowledge the distant applause of an appreciative audience. This isn't big news – many organists, especially the introverted, are secretly pleased with this state of affairs.

But, recent research on the reaction of audience members to musical performances adds another issue to the situation. A 2013 paper entitled "Sight over sound in the judgement of music performance" in the Proceedings of the National Academy of Science by Chia-Jung Tsay (a researcher at University College London) has been drawing the attention of performers from around the world.

The research used recordings of performances from entrants and winners of real music competitions. In a series of experiments, panels of new reviewers, both experts and novices, were asked to see if they could identify the original competition winners by watching the videos of a number of the entrants (including the eventual winner). Most people, as I am sure many of you would, expect that listening to the sound alone would be the most reliable way to replicate the results of the original competition jury. The results were quite surprising. Reviewers who watched a silent version of the videos, who were able to see the movements of the performers but hear nothing, could very reliably identify the original competition winners. But, reviewers that either listened to a sound only recording or watched a video that included sound were generally unable to identify the winner. The research concluded that visual information dominates our evaluation of a musical performance. In evaluating a musical performance we rely heavily on visual information even though we say it's the music we hear that matters.

> For the organist who is rarely seen by the people that listen to, and invariably judge, a performance, what does this mean? It could mean that most who are listening without viewing have been prevented from getting the information that would, in almost every other musical circumstance, dominate their judgement. It could mean we should all have our organ consoles moved to centre stage and adopt styles of playing that looks good. It could mean that an organist, virtually alone amongst musicians, is judged solely on the music that is made. It could be many other things as well.

> Those of us who attend the Pro Organo concert series (wonderful events — if you do not attend you should start) will know that we now provide a video of the performer projected on a screen for the audience. This has been very popular. We can see the performers hands and feet as those difficult passages are played. I wonder if this has changed the opinions we have of our visiting organists. This research would suggest that we appreciate seeing the movements to the exclusion of listening to the performance. Would we have thought differently of the musical performance if we had not been able to see the performer and had to rely only on the sounds from the organ? Something to think about. - Donald Russell


Members' Recital for Eastertide

David Enlow Concert Review

avid Enlow is a rising star in the organ world. A native of Toronto, he studied at the University of Toronto with John Tuttle before heading to the US to study at Curtis and the Julliard. He is currently the Organist and Choir Director of the Church of the Resurrection in New York City, and is on the faculty of the Julliard school. We were fortunate to hear him in recital on the Casavant organ of the chapel of the Bruyère Convent – an organ with a very complete specification over three manuals. The chapel is a large room with an intimate acoustic.

David opened the programme with his transcription of three of the Slavonic Dances of Dvorak. These were lively and colourful, introducing the listener to the various tonal resources of the organ. Then followed Louis Vierne's Naïades from the Pièces de Fantasie, played with great dexterity and musicianship. The smooth sound of the flutes contrasted with the thin, keen strings celeste. Staying with music of the French school, we next heard the Prélude, Fugue et Variation by César Franck – a piece well suited to this organ with its broad fonds de 8'. The fugue was particularly satisfying in David Enlow's performance, with a sense of forward motion and a certain urgency in the pace, never becoming stagnant or complacent; the listener felt drawn into the sound completely. The first half of the programme ended with J.S. Bach's monumental *Toccata and Fugue in F*, BWV 540. The clear sound of the Great plenum sparkled throughout this performance.



The second half of the concert began with another transcription by the performer, this time of the *Holberg Suite* by Edvard Grieg. Each of the five movements had its own character and charm, and seemed completely at home on the organ. The concert ended with an improvised *Prelude and Fugue* on themes submitted by the audience. The *Prelude* moved between the first two themes, *The Last Post* and the hymn *O Vierge tutélaire*, one loud and one soft. The "fugue" was based on the *Huron Carol* (with a return

to the *Last Post*), and was pleasant if somewhat brief and under-developed. The place of improvisation in an organ recital is a question of ongoing debate.

I think I'm the only person at these recitals who doesn't want to watch the organist on a TV screen; I prefer to only listen if the organist is in the gallery. But I must comment on the quality of the closed-circuit TV picture: it was absolutely beautiful. The image was clear and well-lit, and the movement of the camera from hands to feet, etc., was unobtrusive and easy to watch. The fact that David Enlow played the entire programme from memory made it all the more interesting for the audience to be able to visually engage with the performer as the music was created. Kudos to David Enlow and to Pro Organo Ottawa for a wonderful concert.


