Musings on Sonata Form

President's Message

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AS I end my term as President, I have been thinking a lot about planning, goals and achievements. There are several reasons for this, the most musical being an effort to bring more structure to any improvisations I may be called upon to offer. Improvisors and composers usually plan within a musical form. It occurred to me, while thinking about musical forms and my improvisations, that my life, and I think many others, seems to be following some sort of sonata form.

Sonata form is perhaps one of the most sophisticated of the formal forms for a musical work. It can be effective in many different genres and styles and allows the composer great flexibility of expression within its constraints.

The first section is the *exposition*. In this section the composer commonly presents two contrasting themes (or groups of themes) connected by a bridge. This section is generally repeated. It seems to me that when we are young(er) we show ourselves in two different stages. First our personalities (our themes) become apparent to our families and then, probably as a teenager, we show ourselves to the world at large - the repeat of our exposition.

We then, generally, leave home and launch our own independent lives. During this time we grow as individuals, developing our strengths and moving forward to make whatever contributions we can - perhaps raising a family and following a career (or two). This mirrors the second section in sonata form - the *development*. In this section the composer makes use of material from the exposition (the themes) and works with them to create musical meaning. The development often is wide ranging, visiting different keys, using the thematic material in varied forms, in some cases the relationship with the original theme may be barely recognizable, but it is there. As we make choices, we can think



like a good composer and try to reflect on the themes of our life and remain consistent to them. If we do this, we ensure our developments follow the ideals of sonata form.

And then comes the last section of sonata form, the *recapitulation* - a restatement of the exposition, often with minor modifications. I imagine that, as I get older, I will think

back on the themes of my life and see the common thread of material from the beginning (exposition). I also worry that this may represent some sort of end with nothing new yet to come. But, then I remember Beethoven. One of the characteristics of many of his sonata form movements is the presence of a long coda section after the recapitulation. This section is in many ways like another equally large development with a dramatic ending. The themes are further explored

and new meaning is found in the music.

I'm not absolutely sure where I might be in this sonata form - sometimes I think I have not yet presented all of my thematic material and sometimes (especially when I'm tired) I feel as if the recapitulation is over. I hope this analogy is not too laboured. Perhaps others experience their lives in other forms, binary, rondo, et cetera. Or maybe life, in the end, is just through composed. In any case, let's work toward at least a strong coda, working towards a meaningful final cadence.

K Memorable Concert de Michel Bouvard

11 mai dernier, Pro Organo Ottawa nous conviait à un concert d'orgue à la fois instructif et divertissant à l'église Saint-François d'Assise. Cette paroisse qui célèbre cette année le 125^{ème} anniversaire de sa fondation, et son organiste-

titulaire Gilles Leclerc, n'étaient pas peu fiers d'avoir fait coïncider la venue de l'organiste français Michel Bouvard, Titulaire du grand orgue de la basilique Saint-Sernin à Toulouse, avec cet anniversaire, puisque les premiers Capucins venus fonder cette église il y'a 125 ans arrivaient tout droit de Toulouse! Mentionnons aussi que Karen Holmes, Directrice Artistique de Pro Organo, a vécu plusieurs années dans cette ville du Sud de la France, pendant ses études au Conservatoire.

Before the concert, Michel Bouvard read greetings from Father Philippe Bachet, on behalf of today's Capuchin priests in Toulouse. Father Philippe Bachet was, in fact, a classmate of Karen Holmes in the Toulouse Organ Class!

Michel Bouvard n'était pas seul à la tribune, puisque son épouse Yasuko Uyama Bouvard lui prêtait une troisième main, parfois même une quatrième, m'amenant à dire qu'elle lui prêta « main forte »! Le programme musical à la fois varié, original et divertissant, commençait justement par un *Divertimento* de Mozart (en Fa Majeur, K213).

The Suite was perfectly executed, with all the lightness and carefree indifference suggested by the style. One might have wondered whether one performer would have been sufficient, but the audience nevertheless took pleasure in this moment of delicacy.

Next, the English 18th Century composer Nicholas Carlston proved to be a superb polyphonic writer in this transcription for organ of an *In Nomine*, originally written as a virginals duo.

Two *Préludes en Trio* by Henry Du Mont (1610-1684), consisting of duos to which the composer had added a third voice "to create more harmony", were presented as written. Then a charming little piece from the *Livre d'Orgue de Toulouse* (an 18th Century collection discovered in the '80's by Xavier Darasse) was played by Yoko Uyama Bouvard, with Michel Bouvard providing birdcalls on a hand-held whistle!

Following this, a 3-hand version of *Prélude au Te Deum* by Marc Antoine Charpentier was impeccably performed, but perhaps left the listener beginning to wish for a virtuoso piece!

Le méditatif *Hommage* de Loïc Mallié composé en 2000 et dédié à Michel Bouvard ouvrit véritablement le programme du soliste. Un petit bijou musical allait conclure la première partie



du concert avec les *Variations sur un Noël basque* du grand-père de l'organiste invité, Jean Bouvard. Harmonies et contrepoint bien « ficelés », simplicité dans la forme, habileté dans les divers procédés d'écriture utilisés, à la fois classique et symphonique,

> cette pièce touchante et vibrante fit entendre d'intéressantes registrations et laissa présager une deuxième partie envoûtante.

La *Passacaille et Fugue* de J.S. Bach ne déçut point : les changements de plans sonores et de couleurs, intelligents et bien équilibrés, nous firent oublier les petites dimensions de l'orgue.

Finesse and power served up by a brilliant and modest musician offered a memorable *Passacaglia*. After two well-executed versions of Bach's chorale *Liebster Jesu*..., Michel Bouvard unveiled the surprise of the concert : an organ transcription of Mendelssohn's *Variations Sérieuses*, Op.54. Here again, the organ transcription of a piano piece adds colours and dynamic changes that give the impression that the work was originally conceived for organ!

Bravo au transcripteur R. Smits qui a réussi là une magnifique adaptation!

L'exécutant a encore une fois brillé dans une exécution vivante, expressive et captivante. Ce fut le clou de la soirée.

Bien applaudi, l'organiste revint – avec sa troisième main! – dans un *Adagio* extrait des *Saisons* de Vivaldi. Que ce soit à deux, trois ou quatre mains, l'orgue de Saint-François d'Assise a sonné fièrement tout au long de cette soirée inoubliable!

Wright at Dominion-Chalmers United, and organist/choir director at the former All

Saints' Anglican, Sandy Hill, for 12 years. He also sang with the Ottawa Choral Society under Brian Law.

Robert joined the RCCO in the 1970s. He earned the College's Service Playing Certificate and the Royal Conservatory of Music Grade 8 organ performance while studying with Frances Macdonnell.

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2015 Godfrey Hewitt Scholarship


Godfrey Hewitt Memorial Scholarship for 2015, amounting to \$5,000, has been awarded to

RACHEL MAHON

Rachel holds a Bachelor of Music degree in Organ Performance from the University of Toronto, where she studied with John Tuttle. Whilst pursuing her degree, Rachel was the Bevan Organ Scholar at Trinity College, University of Toronto as well as the Principal Organist at Timothy Eaton Memorial Church. She has won numerous awards and competitions in Canada, including one of five graduating scholarships from the Faculty of Music. Rachel has held organ scholarships at St. James Cathedral, Toronto and at Truro Cathedral, England, and is currently the William and Irene Miller Organ Scholar at St. Paul's Cathedral, London, England. She studies with Henry Fairs at the Birmingham Conservatoire.

In 2012, Rachel founded the duo Organized Crime with her Canadian colleague Sarah Svendsen, a former winner of this Scholarship. The two organists aim to entertain audiences with their music and a variety of other antics; more information about their unique performances may be found at **organizedcrimeduo.com**.

Godfrey Hewitt, C.D., D.Mus. (Cantuar), FRCO, Hon. ARSCM, died in 2002 at the age of ninety-three. For over seventy years a prominent figure in sacred music in Canada, Dr. Hewitt left a very significant legacy to Canadian music. Born in England in 1909, he came to Canada in 1931 after serving as Organist for the Archbishop of Canterbury at Lambeth Palace, London, in 1930. He became Organist and Master of the Choristers at Christ Church Cathedral, Ottawa, in 1931, and remained there for half a century, until his retirement in 1980. In 1973, Dr. Hewitt was awarded the Lambeth Doctorate of Music by the Archbishop of Canterbury; he was made a Member of the Order of Canada in 1976. He was famed as performer, teacher, composer,



and organ designer. This scholarship was established after his death both to honour his memory and to increase the number of highly-trained professional Canadian organists, not only to serve as organists in universities, concert halls, and churches, but also to teach future generations of performers. Previous winners of this scholarship were Craig Humber (2005), Isabelle Demers (2006), Michael Unger (2007), Ryan Jackson (2008), Matthieu Latreille (2009), Shawn Potter (2010), Wendy Nieuwenhuis (2011), Stephen Boda (2012), Sarah Svendsen (2013), and Julie Pinsonneault (2014). The next annual competition for the Godfrey Hewitt Memorial Scholarship in organ will close on April 30th, 2016. There is also a Godfrey Hewitt Prize of \$5,000, awarded as the Grand Prize bi-annually at the National Organ-Playing Competition at the RCCO National Convention; the next Prize will be awarded in July 2015.

More Thanks to Angela Hewitt

again owe our heartfelt thanks to the great Canadian concert pianist, Angela Hewitt, who on May 15th, 2015, gave a fund-raising concert at Christ Church Cathedral in Victoria, BC. The concert's profits were split equally between Ottawa Centre's Godfrey Hewitt Memorial Fund and the concert series of Victoria's Christ Church Cathedral.



The Victoria Cathedral was overflowing for the concert – from all accounts, it was a fantastic concert, and a total of \$32,000 was raised. Half of this amount, or \$16,000, will come to the Godfrey Hewitt Memorial Fund.

With this sum added to the capital of the Fund, we hope to offer an increasing number of Godfrey Hewitt Memorial Recitals, to be given by Canadian organists who have received either the Godfrey Hewitt Scholarship, an annual award of \$5,000, or the Godfrey Hewitt Grand Prize of \$5,000 offered every other year at the RCCO's National Organ-Playing Competition. You'll find a list of past winners is on our Centre website.

The first two Memorial Recitals have been announced to be held at RCCO National Conventions. The first one, during the Winnipeg Organ Festival this July, will be given by our own Ottawa member Shawn Potter, who won the Hewitt Scholarship in 2010 and the Hewitt Prize in 2013. The second will be given at the Kingston National Convention in 2016 by Isabelle Demers winner of the Godfrey Hewitt Scholarship in 2006.

This new money will enable us to offer some recitals outside RCCO Conventions as well. We expect that the recital series in Victoria's Christ Church Cathedral will be the first of these, in which our Fund will help outside organizations to sponsor recitals to be given by Hewitt laureates.

As well as offering the annual Scholarship of \$5,000, the bi-annual Prize of \$5,000, and the Memorial Recital of \$2,500, the Godfrey Hewitt Fund also grants \$1,000 to each National Convention

which sponsors a Student Academy; these Academies were started at Orgelfest in Ottawa in 2013, and are continuing annually - London in 2014, Winnipeg in 2015, and Kingston in 2016.

In addition, of course, the Godfrey Hewitt Fund also gives a grant to our own Pro Organo Series in Ottawa whenever it presents a Hewitt laureate in recital.

Many thanks are due from us all to Angela Hewitt, the Honorary Patron of the RCCO nationally, who has raised a tremendous amount of money for this Fund in her father's memory. Thank you, Angela! It is wonderful that we are able to continue to support Canadian organists through the Godfrey Hewitt Memorial Fund.

And thanks also to our friend Ian Alexander, the Co-Chair of the Music Committee in Christ Church Cathedral in Victoria, who organized such a successful fund-raising concert.
