

A native of Toronto, Kola Owolabi is Associate Professor of Organ at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor. There he teaches courses in organ, improvisation and church music. From

2007 to 2013, he taught at Syracuse University and served as University Organist. He also held positions as Sub Dean and Dean of the Syracuse Chapter of the American Guild of Organists.

He holds degrees in organ performance and choral conducting from McGill University, Yale University and Eastman School of Music. His former teachers have included Bruce Wheatcroft, John Grew, Martin Jean, Thomas Murray, Hans

Davidsson and William Porter.

Dr. Owolabi is a published composer and has received commissions from the Royal Canadian College of Organists and the Catholic Archdiocese of Toronto. His solo organ composition Dance was selected for the RCCO National Competition in August 2013.

The Great Bach Bach Marathon 4

he Great Bach Marathon 4 is coming on Saturday, May 2, 2020. Have you volunteered

to play and/or assist with 'backstage' responsibilities? Did you check the Ottawa Centre website to learn what you might play? For the fourth foray into Bach we are focusing on The Great Eighteen Chorale Preludes, the Schübler Chorales and the Orgelbüchlein. To discover what is not taken, please check the Ottawa Centre website. The website will be updated every few days during October so that each person will know what is available to perform.

An exciting part of this year's Great Bach Marathon 4 will be the two children's sessions on constructing an organ. The children will construct the OrgelKids Can organ and have the opportunity to play it. The two sessions will be led by Joshua Zentner-Barrett. At the conclusion of the sessions, the children will present their work by Bach on the grand piano at Woodroffe United Church. Audience – parents, friends and interested listeners –will sit in the front rows of the sanctuary to enjoy the excitement of discovery by the young people.

Rachel Laurin will present "Bach Paraphrase" by the Swedish composer Anders Bjorjeson. This music is written especially for the small organ. We offer an opportunity for the young students to learn about the construction of an organ – what makes it sound – and the opportunity to hear master organists who are willing to share their life-long passion with all the attendees.

We will welcome competition winners from the Ottawa Piano Festival. We also welcome all of you to participate by being

Laurin - Marchand Concert Review

audience at the first Pro 'he Organo recital of the season on September 13th were treated to a wonderful program. The concert featured a variety of works for organ and flute, played by Rachel Laurin and Claire Marchand respectively, that demonstrated not only the colours of Knox Presbyterian's five division organ (Casavant 1933/Raudsepp 2001), but also the full range and several special effects possible on the flute. Baroque and modern composers were featured throughout the evening, and the premiere of Rachel Laurin's Création Sonate pour Flûte et Orgue took place at the end.

The first few pieces were Baroque works for flute and organ, *Sonate en sol mineur*, BWV 1020, by J.S. Bach and *Sonate No. 7 en Fa majeur*, by G.F. Handel. These pieces demonstrated the fine ensemble playing of the duo, as they brought out all the grace and rhythm of this repertoire.

Also, Claire played a solo on some variations of *Les Folies d'Espagne* by Marin Marais which had lovely melodic lines. After these more delicate works, Rachel Laurin pulled out all the stops for Max Reger's *Toccata et Fugue en la mineur*, with its opening pedal solo and tremendous cascades on the manuals. This piece was an opportunity to feature the Gallery pipes – so delightful to hear sound coming from both ahead and behind.

The second half opened with a very modern Sonata de Chiesa by Frank Martin, an expressive piece that began very mysteriously with the highest notes of flute and organ, and moved on to become very playful in places. This work was followed by a wonderful suite of organ and flute solos put together just for this concert. The suite called *Hommage* aux Oiseaux consisted of several pieces that use the types of bird sounds that can be produced so well on flute and organ, for example Louis Claude Daquin's Le Coucou. For this suite Claire Marchand played from the gallery, so there was a dialogue back and forth as organist and flutist took turns playing their pieces.

Surely the highlight of the evening, however, was saved for the last – Rachel Laurin's new piece, *Création Op. 84 for organ and flute*, commissioned by Karen Holmes for this concert – a true delight. The opening Allegro moderato featured the beautiful sound of the flute, starting out very calm and picking up at the end. The second movement, *Hommage a l'Aurore*, sounded the most modern of the three as it used special effects on the flute, like blowing without any pitch, to represent a painting by Gisèle Benoit of the forest at dawn, and the birds and animals that dwell there. The music was truly picturesque. For the final movement, *Mouvement perpétuel*, one might expect there would be lots of passage work without much compositional interest, but that was not the case. Instead we heard again some of the motives that depicted the forest in the second movement, only now it seemed the day had begun and the forest was a much busier place! This piece, and indeed the whole concert, was enjoyed by all.

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

Approval may be granted on the basis that this **extraordinary** event would be of specific interest to our members: e.g., church/choral, and/or organ/bells, **and/or the** encouragement of young organists and pianists.

3. If a non-member wishes to announce an event of his/her organization in Around Town **free of charge**, he/she must make a written request to the RCCO Centre Executive for approval of that one specific event. Approval may be granted per Policy 2; in most circumstances, however, we would expect the Organization to pay as per the rates set out by the Centre for advertising.
