

God is Always With Us Whatever The Circumstances

As, with all the accompanying risks of the current pandemic, my eight grandchildren are back in school or daycare, I have realised that gathering as a family of eighteen to celebrate Thanksgiving, cannot happen this year. And, I confess, the thought arose unbidden in my mind, *So what is there to be thankful about?*

It's so human to get into this negative way of thinking, especially at this time when we have lost touch with a way of life that offered us the freedom to be readily in touch with others. And, while we had a wonderful lull in the late summer, because there is now an upsurge in people having COVD-19, here in Ontario and over the river in Quebec, distancing is still the order of the day! And all that goes with it.

It's easy with such an attitude to 'not see' the blessings that have come out of this situation. As I write for the RCCO, I think especially of music leaders and how so many in this online 'savvy' society have deepened and expanded their skills in the virtual presentation of music, offering regularly at least the music for on line church services. Indeed, with such offerings being available, this has brought together folks beyond the immediate congregation, even from across the world! It's harder to see what we can be thankful for as our senior members may have experienced lifestyle and health challenges. And yet surely we can be thankful that medical resources are there for them and that many, overcome by challenges, have care homes that can offer them shelter. And as the needs posed by the pandemic have exposed grim realities for residents in some care homes, authorities are now in a position, which they were not previously, to demand improvements.

As I have reflected on my very human moment of negativity, I have been reminded of Paul's admonition in his letter to the Thessalonians: *Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of Christ Jesus for you* (1 Thessalonians 5: 17). This surely epitomizes the faithful response to living out our daily lives, whether we are back in the world as we knew it before March, or indeed today.

The phrase Give thanks in all circumstances has indeed reminded me of The Hiding Place,* an autobiographical novel by Corrie Ten Boom about her and her sister's days in concentration camps, during the second world war. They were there as an outcome of assisting Jewish families to escape from the Nazi authorities in their hometown of Haarlem. The joy of following God's will on behalf of their Jewish brothers and sisters in the alien world of Nazi invaded Holland was so deep for these two women of active faith. If anything, their imprisonment in the camps increased their determination to follow Christ's will. They approached their days with a deep spirit of rejoicing, celebrating every small blessing as it arose.

And there came the day when Corrie returned from a work detail. Here was Betsy full of joy and excitement, telling her how she had discovered that being thankful for the fleas in their prison hut was indeed hugely pertinent. As she had looked back on the days since the presence of fleas had increased, this had surely been keeping the guards, who could be so deeply cruel, at bay! They found themselves being thankful for a reality which, in normal circumstances, would have been seen as abhorrent.

I wonder indeed what circumstances are evident through this pandemic which could give rise to a state of thankfulness within ourselves, even as in normal circumstances we might not see this. As we turn around from a temptation maybe to go negative, and in faith respond to Christ's call to rejoice always, pray constantly giving thanks in, yes, all circumstances, what blessings may we indeed now see in the realities in which we find ourselves?

As we anticipate Thanksgiving Sunday, let us rejoice that God is always with us, whatever the circumstances.



Approval may be granted on the basis that this **extraordinary** event would be of specific interest to our members: e.g., church/choral, and/or organ/bells, **and/or the** encouragement of young organists and pianists.

3. If a non-member wishes to announce an event of his/her organization in Around Town **free of charge**, he/she must make a written request to the RCCO Centre Executive for approval of that one specific event. Approval may be granted per Policy 2; in most circumstances, however, we would expect the Organization to pay as per the rates set out by the Centre for advertising.
