The concert has been pre-recorded on an organ in the Kansas City area that is quite similar to the one at St-François-d'Assise. These last weeks, as I have walked the pathway by the Ottawa River, I

have been struck by the Michaelmas daisies along the way, so deeply purple. And as I enjoyed feasting my eyes upon them, metaphorical bells were ringing in my head.

After a day or two, the penny figuratively dropped! I remembered how these purple daisies featured in my first column for Pipelines in October, 2019! I spoke about how white daisies in the UK – where I grew up – were commonplace. It was like all those strangers in Manchester and London where I lived, I would see them everywhere. And yet, I fantasized that if I were to dare to speak with any one of them – hard to do with my mother's words ringing in my head, Don't talk to strangers! - such an experience would transform whomever it was from seeming so two a penny like any common daisy with its insipid white colouring, into a live human whom surely any artist would portray in the deepest purple!

These were men and women offering the possibility of becoming persons painted vividly on the canvas of my experience; with complex daily lives that could evoke from me or yourself those compelling words:

More than we could ever ask or imagine!

Of course, such a possibility has become out of range for us all in these days as physical distancing during this Pandemic has become the order of the day. As I write this, the public health authorities have implored us yet again to restrict our visiting to those within our immediate household. I confess that this did not stop me going masked first thing this morning to Hallmark. As a volunteer on the Spiritual Care Team for Cornerstone, a social service agency offering sheltered housing for women, and run by the Anglican Diocese of Ottawa, I was doing my part to find a number of cards; not this time for the residents of the 5 shelters whom we have tried so hard to support through the years, but for the 50 or so staff. Each card will be affixed to a packet of homemade goodies created by the 2 bakers on the team. And what are these gifts celebrating? Yes, the royal – purple - efforts of all these staff who day in, day out, and, in some of the 5 shelters, every night, have been there through this

Pandemic, trying to support the residents in these 'crazy' times. The message in all of these 50 or so cards will be: A big thank you to you for hanging in there through these long days of the Pandemic. It is so appreciated!



And so, may I now put on another of my volunteer hats, and turn to all of the organists and choir directors out there through the Ottawa area? All of you. And just as special to me. I do this in trust that, after the last twelve months of working with our Pipelines Editor, Rick St. Germain, he will find just the right 'pic' to accompany these same words:

A big thank you also to all of you for hanging in there through these long days of the Pandemic, and offering royal, yes, 'purple' efforts on behalf of your church communities. It is so appreciated!

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
