for organ solo (10-12 minutes) to be Premiered in 2022. Congratulations to every candidate: I'm convinced that every proposal was deserving! It was my third try, and I did'nt believe too much in the result... Let's never abandon!

The project I propose is an organdemonstrator, for the Halloween Season, with narrator (optional) based on the story by Washington Irving "The Legend of Sleepy Hollow". This story is perfectly suited to show the contrasting colours of the organ, and will captivate the listener, while introducing the organ sounds to the ones less familiar with the King of Instruments! I'm truly looking forward to work on this project!

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Leipzig Bach Medal for Angela Hewitt

CITY OF LEIPZIG BACH MEDAL presented to ANGELA HEWITT, CC, OBE Honorary Patron, Royal Canadian College of Organists

Every year since 2003, the Lord Mayor of the City of Leipzig awards the Bach Medal in recognition of efforts to promote the work of Johann Sebastian Bach. The medal jury consists of the director of the Bach Archive, the musical director of the Leipzig Gewandhaus, the Cantor of the Thomaskirche, the headmaster of the University of Music & Theatre *Felix Mendelssohn Bartholdy* Leipzig, and three other personalities from the field of music.

This year, in 2020, Angela Hewitt has been honoured for 'her many-sided and longstanding commitment to the music of Johann Sebastian Bach, her genuine impact as a Bach ambassador all over the world, and her benchmark Bach interpretations on the concert grand piano'. Though delayed by the pandemic, the presentation was finally made in the Thomaskirche by Dr. Skadi Jennike, Lord Mayor of Leipzig, on Tuesday November 17, following which Angela played the Goldberg Variations in the church.

Previous winners of the Leipzig Bach Medal have included Gustav Leonhardt, Sir John Eliot Gardiner, and Ton Koopman. Angela Hewitt is the first woman to be awarded the Medal.

In March of 2020, when all concert activity and travelling abruptly stopped due to the coronavirus pandemic, Angela went online to share daily offerings of short pieces. She gave some of the first streamed concerts online during the pandemic—including a Bach recital from Wigmore Hall in London, and a socially-distanced performance for the Edinburgh Festival of Beethoven's First Piano Concerto in a version for string quintet and piano. The months at home gave her the opportunity to learn Beethoven's mammoth "Hammerklavier" Sonata, Op. 106, thus completing her cycle of the 32 Sonatas. After more recitals at Wigmore Hall in September 2020, she returned to Canada in October, performing the Art of Fugue in Toronto and Ottawa, thereby completing her Bach Odyssey (despite having to go into quarantine for 14 days in order to do so).

In 2006 Angela was awarded an OBE by Queen Elizabeth II, and in 2015 she was promoted to a Companion of the Order of Canada. She was named 'Artist of the Year' at the 2006 Gramophone Awards, 'Instrumentalist of the Year' at the 2010 MIDEM Classical Awards at Cannes, and in 2018 received the Governor General's Lifetime Achievement Award in Ottawa. She is a member of the Royal Society of Canada, holds seven honorary doctorates, is a Visiting Fellow of Peterhouse College, Cambridge, - and of course, along with Dame Gillian Weir, is one of the two Honorary Patrons of the Royal Canadian College of Organists. Her performance of the Art of Fugue was the highlight of the RCCO Organ Festival held in Ottawa in 2013. Congratulations, Angela!

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Kiwanis Music Festival Organ Classes

ast April, when the Kiwanis
Music Festival was scheduled to
take place, most of its classes were held
virtually because of the pandemic; but
because the churches had closed and the
organ students were not able to practise,
the organ classes had to be delayed for
some months. Even now, as you know,
there are some students who still have
difficulty obtaining practice time.

In the end, the classes took place on Saturday November 21 in the First Church of Christ, Scientist; we are very grateful to the church for their welcome and hospitality to the students. The Kiwanis Festival kindly gave the RCCO permission to run the classes ourselves (though they paid the insurnace to cover the day) and they transferred the available scholarship molney to the RCCO; Mervyn Games, the resident organist of the church, generously allowed practice time for the students, and Rachel Laurin did a wonderful job as adjudicator. Thank you, everyone!

Six students had registered to compete last April; one of them has since left Ottawa, and one is presently unable to practise. Of the remaining four students, two elected to record their pieces and submit them electronically, and the other

two played live. Here are the classes, and the marks awarded by Rachel Laurin, who heard both the electronic submissions and the live performances:

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
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Advertising Policy

Approval may be granted on the basis that this **extraordinary** event would be of specific interest to our members: e.g., church/choral, and/or organ/bells, **and/or the** encouragement of young organists and pianists.
- 3. If a non-member wishes to announce an event of his/her organization in Around Town **free of charge**, he/she must make a written request to the RCCO Centre Executive for approval of that one specific event. Approval may be granted per Policy 2; in most circumstances, however, we would expect the Organization to pay as per the rates set out by the Centre for advertising.

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
