Healing the Broken-Hearted

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What a difference a week makes. On October 3, a funeral was held at St. Luke's Anglican Church on Somerset Street for its oldest parishioner (3 days before his 98th birthday). He had been baptized at St. Luke's in 1924 and was a life-long member, regularly attending right up to this past June.

Then on the morning of October 11, a devastating fire in the organ's pipe chamber occurred for which a cause has not yet been determined (although arson has been ruled out). The pipes of the Great and Pedal divisions were at the front of the chamber and that is where the damage was centred. Firefighters removed most of these pipes, many of them strewn throughout the chancel the front of the nave. Some of the Bourdon pipes had opposite sides missing, and the remaining sides badly charred. The Choir division seems to be still intact as has the Swell, although the front wall of the Swell division (which contained the shutters) had been removed.

2022 is a special year for St. Luke's: the congregation was founded 150 years ago, and the current building opened 100 years ago (the cornerstone being laid

by former prime minister Robert Borden). Special celebrations were planned for October 16—including the premiere of a new mass setting composed by friend, colleague and choir member Deirdre Piper—but these are now on hold.

The organ was Casavant's Opus 1539: 25 stops spread over 3 manuals and pedal, purchased for \$7,800 in 1937. In 1991, when the parish tore down its parish hall and built the Serson Clarke apartment complex, the firm of Caron, Gagnon & Baumgarten renovated the organ, which included some revoicing, a Solid State piston system with 8 memory levels, and placing the console on a dolly. It was a wonderful organ in lovely acoustics.

St. Luke's is also home to St. Luke's Table—one of the Anglican Diocese of Ottawa's five community ministries—which provides much-needed community services, such as meals, shower and laundry facilities for those in need, 7 days a week. Water and smoke damage from the fire has caused it to be displaced.

I have been absolutely overwhelmed by the phone

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calls, emails and prayers of so many people, including members of the RCCO. Prior to the pandemic, St. Luke's offered a bi-weekly recital series. Some of the recitalists have offered to do a fund-raising concert. Not knowing that we hadn't resumed the series since the pandemic, Gordon Johnston offered to host our recital series at St. John the Evangelist Church until we could get back into our building. Loyal Beggs--a friend of mine

from my days in Sault Ste. Marie--now works for a funeral home in Ottawa and they offered their chapel (complete with Casavant organ) for our Sunday services.

In the meantime, we're holding our worship services in the chapel of All Saints' Church (Westboro). All the staff and congregation at All Saints have bent over backwards in welcoming us and sharing their building. We observed the Feast of St. Luke on our first Sunday

(October 16). I purposely picked *Dear God, Compassionate and Kind* (a.k.a. *Dear Lord and Father of Mankind*) as one of our hymns. It ends with the phrase *speak through the earthquake, wind and fire, O still small voice of calm.*

We use Gordon Johnston's psalm settings each week: it was especially appropriate that Sunday. The words of the psalm refrain? *Praise the Lord who heals the broken-hearted.*

From 2011-2014 he was the Assisting Organist at Christ Church Cathedral under the

He is active giving informative sessions on musical themes with Opera Lyra and Retraite en Action plus collaborating with singer-songwriter Sandra Savard with whom he forms the Duo d'Hull. In September 2014, Fabien Tousignant became the Director of Music and Organist at Trinity Anglican Church in Ottawa.

For All the Saints

Deirdre and I share a home together in Westboro and, as it happens, in walking distance of the Maplevue Estate, a beautiful old home looking out on to a perennial garden. And being real, not exquisitely manicured, in this fall season I see its windblown, yes, somewhat straggly perennials, mainly in yellow and orange hues. And the one flower I can name is the delphinium, its deepest blue color giving my heart a jolt every time I see it! And in each corner of the garden there is, it seems, a relatively new park bench donated by a family in memory of their loved one.

No doubt I shall be sitting on one of these benches on this coming Tuesday, November 1, on which day in the life of the church we shall be celebrating the lives and offerings of all the saints and ruminating on what this signifies. I quote from that wonderful book, *For All the Saints** published in 1994 by the Anglican Book Centre in Canada:

Pro Organo Gala Concert Review

Over 30 years ago, the Ottawa Centre founded Pro Organo – an annual series of organ recitals featuring ‘the finest organists on the finest organs’. For many years the City of Ottawa provided a grant to help cover expenses but this source hasn’t been available for about a decade.

On October 2, 2022, about 80 organ enthusiasts came out to hear Matthew Larkin and Shawn Potter perform on the four-manual 1965 Casavant organ in Carleton Dominion-Chalmers Centre. (We were encouraged with the attendance, as it was similar to pre-pandemic figures.) With the support of Carleton University who purchased Dominion-Chalmers United Church in 2018, this was a fund-raising concert so that the Ottawa RCCO Centre could continue to offer Pro Organo for the foreseeable future and early indications was that it was a financial and musical success. The concert was first announced in 2020, postponed for over

two years and finally held now, raised a total of \$22,000 during this period to support Pro Organo.

Matthew Larkin, Music Director at St. Andrew’s Presbyterian Church, opened the programme in a thrilling rendition of Louis Vierne’s rousing *Carillon de Westminster*, followed by the peaceful *Prélude*, another selection from Vierne’s *Pièces de Fantaisie*. To celebrate the bi-centennial of the birth of César Franck, Larkin’s stellar performance of the *Choral in E Major* featured the grand phrasing and direction of the chorale sections as well as the lyrical treatment of the quieter sections.

In recognition of the recent passing of Queen Elizabeth II, Larkin concluded with his own arrangement of *Nimrod* (from Edward Elgar’s *Enigma Variations*). Orchestral transcriptions aren’t easily adapted to the organ, and even more difficult on a neo-baroque organ, but

Larkin’s registration was most convincing in his rendering of this fine tribute to our late Queen.

The second half of the programme featured Shawn Potter, Music Director at First Baptist Church, playing repertoire by Böhm, Buxtehude and Bach, so well-suited to this instrument. Beginning with Georg Böhm’s *Prelude in G Minor*, Potter exhibited an articulation that created an uplifting buoyancy to the work. Each variation in the *Partita on ‘Freu dich sehr, o meine Seele’* had its own character, yet the cohesiveness of the entire work was apparent. Dietrich Buxtehude’s *Te Deum laudamus* was a treat. The five-sectioned work was illustrated throughout by Potter’s cerebral yet emotional approach to this music. The joyful mood of Bach’s *Prelude and Fugue in G Major (BWV 541)* was captured from the opening flourish and, coupled with sensitive phrasing, brought the concert to a most successful conclusion.



Promoting Pro Organo Concerts

Did you know that your Ottawa Centre is now using *eventbrite* to promote our long running Pro Organo concert series? Last spring, the Pro Organo team explored using the event platform to promote and manage the concert series in addition to the other efforts such as our website, facebook and online ticket sales via PayPal. The aim in all of this is to reach and promote events as widely and effectively as possible and to keep pace with the ever-changing media environment.

Pro Organo is one of Ottawa’s longest running music/arts series and we offer wonderful concerts in unique settings. Over the last few years, traditional advertisement via newspapers etc. have been in decline, reach smaller audiences and have increased in price. Those factors have caused us to look, adopt and adapt these tools to promote events to a larger and more diverse audience.

eventbrite is an American-based event management and ticketing website that is widely used by the arts community in Ottawa and is THE place to advertise events, manage tickets, and build and support audiences. The platform can be used for free to promote events but when ticketing options are added, there are charges applied to the processing of those transactions. We are probably familiar with these kinds of charges for other online purchases. Although, not ideal, the charges are nominal for the services delivered. The Pro Organo committee did some calculations and we determined that the associated fees for tickets for an average audience is far less than the cost of one advertisement in the Ottawa Citizen.

This fall we launched *eventbrite* to help promote the Gala Fundraising Event on October 2 and for Aaron Tan’s upcoming Pro Organo concert on November 14th.

Both of these postings are for promotion only; we did not add the ticket function for these events but we have plans to add that for the 2023 spring concerts.

As members, we can all help to promote our *eventbrite* listings by going to the site, searching for our concerts (by date or type of event) and consider sharing on one or more social media platforms (Facebook, Messenger, twitter, e-mail), with friends and family.
